
## HANDS-ON LEARNING

Clinical students can handle prep work such as administering injections, performing lab tests, and completing blood draws. This provides students with valuable clinical training; it helps you and your team with your workload!



## PATIENT FOLLOW UPS

Have students help you by providing patients with test results or follow-up instructions.



## CHARTING AND DOCUMENTATION

It's a common misconception that physicians need to re-document any work done by medical students in the EHR. A change to CMS documentation in 2018 means this is no longer the case. Students can chart for you and make your workload easier by doing so!
